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How Cub Scouting Program Modifications Will Offer More Flexibility for Den Leaders Cub Scout Advancement

Modifications Made

The BSA has announced modifications to adventure requirements in response to feedback from den leaders who have run the new Cub Scouting program for a year. Dens may begin using the modified requirements immediately as they begin working on their next adventure.

Busy parents, den leaders and Cubmasters are in for a treat this holiday season that will provide greater flexibility and control over the Cub Scouting program. Effective today, some adventure requirements that were previously mandatory will become optional.

In response to the feedback we've heard from den leaders, these modifications were developed to allow Cub Scouters more control over their den program. A national volunteer task force has reviewed the feedback and determined that the best solution is to make more of the adventure requirements optional, providing maximum flexibility and matching the needs of dens. As Bryan on Scouting puts it, the modifications "reflect the BSA's three-step approach to new programs: Launch. Learn. Modify."

Approved by the National Executive Committee of the Boy Scouts of America, this fine-tuning is simply part of an ongoing process to develop an impactful, innovative program.

What This Means for Your Unit

For those units who have the capacity to handle a high volume of content (meet more often, for longer periods, etc.), the optional requirements remain a part of the program. Those dens are encouraged to complete as many of the optional requirements as they can.



For those units who've struggled to accomplish the greater number of requirements in the new program, the modifications will allow each

adventure to be completed in approximately two den meetings per month. They are designed to make advancement achievable by all Cub Scouts. The new requirements will be posted in a free addendum available at http://www.scouting.org/scoutsource/programupdates.aspxor use the QR code shown here. This will supplement the handbooks in current circulation and for sale online and in Scout shops. Units do not need to buy new materials.

Advancement Note: "No More – No Less"

Each Boy Scout Advancement requirement must be completed as written. No more can be required. No less can be accepted.

Advancement Note 1: "No More – No Less"

Advancement Note 2: Reporting Advancement

All Advancement events (ranks and merit badges) must be reported in a timely fashion.

The work of the District and Council Advancement Committees are made more difficult when reporting is delayed. Delays in processing some ranks can occur through late reporting. Inaccuracies can compound.

The Centennial Family Friends of Scouting (FOS) Campaign Is Underway

A few thoughts as we kick off the annual FOS Campaign:

- Our mission is to give our Scouting families and alumni an informed opportunity to support Mount Baker Council Scouting
- Our district FOS leadership are now prepared to help their Packs, Troops, Crews and Ships to conduct a successful and timely campaign.
- Our District FOS teams are in full recruit and organize mode. Would you be willing and able to tell your reasons for supporting our council to other Scouting families?
- We have an exciting 2017 ahead, with an ongoing need to continue to support FOS.

Why a Family FOS Campaign?

The annual Family Friends of Scouting (FOS) Campaign provides an informed opportunity for all parents, leaders, Chartered Organizations, community members and alumni to provide financial support needed to deliver local Scouting's character-building



programs. Rather than charging the actual cost of Scouting when new members join, we collect only the National BSA registration fee, which we forward to our National Office. Thereafter, we ask for a voluntary contribution at whatever level families feel good about. Each unit should set its own FOS goal based on the understanding that our council spends about \$190 dollars to support each Scout in our council service area. Part of a unit's FOS goal should be 100% participation by all its families.

Where Friends of Scouting Dollars Go: FOS covers the costs of staff support, camp and office operations, record keeping, insurance, program equipment and activities, printing and mailing and many other expenses.

How do Packs, Troops, Crews and Ships Participate?

District Family FOS Chairs contact unit leaders to schedule unit FOS presentations to explain how Scouting is financed and how local support is needed. These short presentations are usually made in a group meeting setting, either by leaders in the unit or by district volunteers. LDS Stakes conduct their own Family Campaigns by ward and are trained and supported by a Stake FOS Chair. The Family Campaign is conducted in January, February and March.

Units will be given a goal, based upon their 2017charter renewal youth membership. These goals will be multiplied by \$190, the cost to operate our council divided by the number of Scouts we serve. The total is listed as the unit Presidential goal. That unit goal also takes into consideration the historical giving information and other factors related to the makeup of the unit. All that is asked is that each unit gives their families an educated opportunity to participate in the annual FOS campaign.

2017 District Family Friends of Scouting (FOS) Kickoffs at January **Roundtables**

The Family FOS Campaign for 2017 will kick off at the January Roundtables in our seven districts. Prior to that meeting, Pack, Troop and Crew Committees are asked to select a Family FOS Chair or Coordinator who can attend the FOS Kickoff to receive materials and instructions on successfully conducting this year's campaign.



The Theme for the 2017 Family Campaign Having completed the Scout Law patch series, we move on to our council's centennial celebration with "A Century of Service". Our special patch design notes our tremendous contributions to the communities we service since 1917. The border of each patch changes to recognize the donor's giving level. First 100 Units to Sign Up for their FOS Presentation Earn a very collect-

There are 100 special FOS patches reserved for the Unit FOS Coordinators of the first 100 units to schedule their FOS presentations with their District FOS Team. Contact your district's Family FOS Chair to schedule your date and earn the very limited edition patch!

Unit and Individual Recognition

In order to qualify for the FOS recognition, units must reach an average contribution level per Scout registered for 2017. Levels include: \$190 (Presidential), \$160 (Gold),\$120 (Silver) and \$95 (Bronze). Recognition includes patches for donors and discounts at Fire Mountain Scout Camp. **NOTE**: Unit FOS packets and pledge cards must be turned in by April 30th to qualify for camp discounts.

Employee Matching Hour Grants and FOS Credit

More and more companies are directing their charitable dollars towards the organizations for which their employees volunteer their time. Since Scouting is a volunteer-driven organization, we can benefit greatly from this source. In our area, Microsoft and Boeing are the two biggest contributors toward our council but many more companies are providing matching hour and matching donation (FOS) programs. See your HR department or business website for details.

Payroll donations: Boeing ECF, CFC, United Way designations, Combined Federal Campaign and other workplace donations are not considered FOS (IRS rule) but may count toward FOS recognition goals. Just indicate such on your pledge form.

WHEN IN DOUBT - FOLLOW THE PLAN

As the Council FOS Chair, I want to remind all those conducting the FOS campaign to simply "Follow the Plan." This applies to District Finance Teams, District Presenters, Unit FOS Coordinators and Unit Leaders. Basically, in order for the campaign to be successful, it requires everyone to understand, participate and embrace the reasons behind the FOS Campaign. Take time to review the materials presented at the Kickoff. Unit Coordinators should take advantage of the materials in the packet including the sample letters. In addition, there are new expectations for Unit Coordinators to follow-up with families that may not pick up their pledge cards at the presentation.

Microsoft Employees Can Earn FOS Credit for Reporting Volunteered Scouting Service Hours

Microsoft has raised their hourly matching grant rate from \$17 to \$25 per hour of volunteer service! \$17 will still be credited to FOS campaigns while \$8 will go to our Capital Campaign to help improve Fire Mountain Scout Camp!

Requesting a Microsoft Gift Match for 10 or more Volunteer Hours

Microsoft currently matches hours spent volunteering with qualifying organizations at the rate of \$25 per hour up to \$12,000 per year! To report your hours and have the money sent to the Mount Baker Council, you submit your request at Microsoft's Give site following the directions below:

- While on the Microsoft Intranet, go to http://give.
- Click the Match Now button.
- Click the Volunteer Connections button.
- Click Record Hours.
- If you haven't donated directly to Mount Baker Council in the past, you will need to search for their organization. Under Organization Search, enter "Mount Baker Council" in the Keywords field and "Washington" in the State field. Click on Search and you will be presented with a list of organizations. Under Volunteer Activities you will find the Boy Scouts under "Education/Youth Development" > "Scouting Organization". Select the one listed below.

- Enter your volunteer hours.
- After entering 10 hours, hit Request for Match to complete the process

Please note the following restrictions when reporting your hours:

Microsoft's guidelines for the time matching program are designed to match time an employee spends providing a direct benefit to the community. Therefore, time spent preparing for, leading, or engaging in direct activities may be eligible, but we are not able to match the portions of your request that cover time spent traveling, eating, sleeping, or in other 'down time.' If you were in a chaperoning or 'on call' situation, please include an estimate only of the time you were providing active assistance.

Getting FOS credit for your Pack, Troop or Crew before the April 30th Recognition Date:

After your hours are reported, a confirmation email is sent to Tonya Reynolds at the Everett Service Center. Microsoft requires that volunteer hours be confirmed by the recipient organization designated by the employee. Now that hours are confirmed by the council there is no longer any reason to print the page confirming your hours. Additionally, Microsoft has contracted with Benevity Giving Platform to manage their Volunteer Hours and Matching Gifts program. Checks are now received monthly from Benevity.

Other Ways to Promote and Support Mount Baker Council Scouting

Tips from Microsoft's Community Affairs staff for the Microsoft employee:

NOTE: During the October Giving Campaign the non-solicitation policy is loosened but not lifted.

Synch up with your VPAL in August to see if there are ways you can share your passion at an upcoming All Hands meeting, team meeting or a departmental Giving Campaign event. Not sure who your VPAL is? Send an email to give@microsoft.com requesting the information.

Create a "give" video on http://give and share your cause/story with other MS employees. Go to http://give and click on "upload your video/ photo and story.

Create an email footer to promote your cause. Use a thumbnail image (perhaps a screenshot from your video) and hyperlink to the landing page where your video is hosted.

Change your Outlook picture to your organization's logo. Go to http://my, click **My Profile** and **Edit My Profile**. Be sure to indicate your Scouting affiliation-pack, Troop, District, etc.

• Most important – share the method for reporting volunteered hours with other Microsoft employees who may not know how.

Do Microsoft payroll deduction donations count for FOS Credit?

For those Microsoft employees that participate in payroll deduction and have designated that amount to be distributed to the Mount Baker Council, BSA, please fill out a Friends of Scouting pledge card and indicate that on the card. You can choose to note the annual amount or the monthly amount. Please checkmark 'yes' that you do participate in a payroll deduction plan.

Once an FOS pledge card has been received and the council receives the first check from Benevity, the donation will be entered under the employee's name and credited to the Pack, Troop or Crew that was indicated on the pledge card.

Money-Saving Tip For BSA Volunteers



If you itemize deductions on your federal income tax return, you may be able to deduct many of the expenses you incur as a BSA volunteer; examples include leader uniforms, mileage, and training fees. To qualify, the expenses must be unreimbursed, directly connected with your volunteer service, and

incurred only because of that service. Personal, living, or family expenses do not count, nor do expenses incurred for your children who are in Scouting. Reasonable and necessary standards apply. For more information, see *IRS Publication 526* or consult your tax advisor.

All words many of you know by heart, and show in your heart, by helping others. One of Scouting's objectives is to help youth learn qualities of citizenship through service to others. Community service projects are activities that make youth feel competent, capable, and that they've made a difference. Whether it be a food collection, litter pickup, collecting toothbrushes and socks for the homeless, trail maintenance, Tree of Giving, stream restoration, school flag ceremonies, Veteran's Day/ Memorial Day flag placement, caroling at senior centers, Eagle Scout projects (the opportunities are endless!), Scouts make a positive impact in our communities.

Civic service is so important to the Scouting program that they've included it as a benchmark of a quality unit. You saw it as part of your Journey to Excellence. Did you know that recording the service hours of your unit's Scouts and adult volunteers is also a requirement of the JTE? It's a simple as logging into your my.scouting.org account, scrolling down on the left to Legacy Web Tools and clicking on Service Hours Reporting. New users will need their unit's ID # which can be obtained from the Scout Office. Your unit number will be 4 digits long (just add '0's' in front if your unit number is less than 4 digits long, i.e. 12 would be 0012). It is also the same ID number used for Internet Advancement.

Countless hours go unreported. Your unit's service hours are key to your JTE, your district's own JTE, as well as Mount Baker Council's JTE. As of this writing, Mount Baker Council is about 32,000 hours, which qualifies for the Silver Level for Service Hours. Because so many hours go un-reported, the council is more likely at a Platinum level!

On-Line Internet Advancement Update for 2017 and other information you should know...

The Mount Baker Council's Executive Board requires that all units (Packs, Troops, Teams, Crews and Ships) use Boy Scouts of America's On-Line Internet Advancement System (https://scoutnet.scouting.org/iadv/ui/home/default.aspx). This policy became effective on December 31, 2015 and was approved by the Mount Baker Council Executive Board on March 19, 2015.

Why? Internet Advancement helps in two areas:

- First, the number of un-registered Scouts is lower as units (Packs, Troops, Teams, Crews and Ships) ensure that all youth applications are submitted and are registered before any earned advancements can be recorded.
- The second benefit is the long-term reduction in overhead as fewer documents are handled.

As of December 31, 2015, the Mount Baker Council's Bellingham and Everett Service Centers accept only the Boy Scouts of America's Advancement Report (generated from the Internet Advancement System at https://scoutnet.scouting.org/iadv/ui/home/default.aspx) and no longer accepts other versions of an advancement report, which includes reports from programs like TroopMaster, PackMaster, Scout-Trax, CubTrax, Scoutbook and all handwritten reports. To aid unit Advancement Chairs, the Mount Baker Council's Bellingham and Everett Service Centers provide a computer and internet access to those volunteers who need it so advancement information can be entered into the Internet Advancement system.

Also— If your advancement report has a section that says DRAFT, do not turn this draft copy into the Service Center. A "DRAFT" report means that all of the rank advancement and awards that have been entered are not saved. You will need to click the "Submit to Council" tab, a short survey pops up (leave blank or if you want to make a comment to National you can do this by typing it in the box), click Save, Next, and then "Submit to Council". Print the report and bring it with you to the Scout shop to pick up your badges.

As of January 1, 2017, all Scouts must use the new rank requirements regardless of rank or partial completion of old rank requirements. For instance, if a Scout has been working on First Class for the last year, and it was not finished in 2016, he will need to use the new 2017 requirements. However, he can use the requirements that he has already completed that still fulfill the new requirements.

If you are storing old blank youth and adult applications, please recycle them and use the most recent version. The BSA youth application has 524-406 in the lower left corner and the adult application has 524-501.

Boy Scout Civics 101

Every boy who has walked the path to Eagle has passed through responsibilities to the best of our ability. Communities, nations, and societies are stronger, happier, and more prosperous when good citizenship prevails.

Civics, the study of the rights and duties of citizenship, is a necessary precursor to good citizenship. After all, how can you

very brief primer on our Council organization and purpose - Boy Scouts Civics 101, if you will – with the hope that it will be help all of us as we work together in this great movement.

What is the "Council" and what does it do?

At its most fundamental level, a BSA council is a voluntary association of chartered organizations and other men and women who are interested in the youth within the council area. It If you want more information about council governance, purposes, or organization, please receives its charter from the Boy Scouts of America to provide leadership and supervision to all program activities within the council boundaries and to assist chartered organizations and the units they sponsor to fulfill the purposes of the Boys Scouts of America. The council is charged with establishing policies and programs for Scouting within its territory.

How is the council governed?

The governing body of the council ("Council Body") consists of the chartered organization representatives of each organization chartered to operate units. Also serving on the Council Body are "members at large" that are elected by Council Body. The Council Body meets at least once each year, but can meet more often to handle special business. The Council Body elects officers for the council and also elects the council "Executive Board" - which from a practical standpoint is the active governing body of the council, empowered by the Council Body to act in its stead.

The Executive Board, which includes all council officers and district chairs, acts to govern the overall activities of the council, including, among other things, adopting budgets, coordinating fundraising, filling interim vacancies and positions, selecting the Scout executive, and approving programs and plans of council committees. In the Mount Baker Council, the Executive Board typically meets every two months.

The council "Executive Committee" typically is made up of council officers and may include others appointed by the council president. It is empowered to act between Executive Board meetings, but all Executive Committee actions must late be ratified by the Executive Board. In the Mount Baker Council, the Executive Committee typically meets every two months during the months that the Executive Board doesn't meet.

The Executive Committee includes the "Council Key 3," - the president, the council commissioner and the Scout Executive. The Key 3 meet regularly to coordinate the work of the council, but they may not act in lieu of the Executive Board or Executive Committee. In addition to the Key 3, council officers include one or more council vice presidents (who typically oversee functional areas) and the council treasurer. These officers typically perform the day-to-day functions of the council and provide support to their counterparts in council districts.


What do council districts do?

Unlike councils, which establish policies and programs, districts carry out the programs and policies of the council in their respective territories. 





For the year 2017 your Council Key 3 will be traveling around the Council to recognize 50 outstanding Scouters. We can't do this with you. Award Criteria:

What is it?

 The "President's Excellence in Leadership Award" is a Council level award that is given to an individual who has demonstrated exemplary leadership through an event or initiative that made a significant impact at the unit, district or council level.

Who is Eligible?

 Any Scout or Scouter in good standing in the Mount Baker Council area is eligible to be nominated for the award.

Who decides the recipients of the award?

• The Council Key Three (Council President, Council Commissioner and Council Scout Executive) based on nominations.

What are the criteria for the award?

- Is in good standing with the Council
 - Currently a registered Scout Leader or Scout
 - Current on required training
- Has provided leadership to an event or initiative at the unit, district or council level
- Has either:
 - Exceeded the goals set for the event/initiative; OR
 - Set and met goals that significantly exceeded past performance
- The leadership of the individual is obvious to a broad range of people

How is it awarded?

Centennial James E. West Fellowship Awards

2017 Goal of 100 New Fellowships

What is a James E. West Fellowship Award?

The James E. West Fellowship Award is recognition authorized by the National Council, BSA and presented by the local Councils for individuals and chartered units who contribute \$1,000 or more in cash or securities to the Council Endowment fund. This fund provides the Mount Baker Council with a secure source of annual funding in perpetuity.

Who was James E. West?

James E. West was appointed to the position of Chief Scout Executive in 1910 by the founding leadership of Scouting in America. West worked with Sir Robert Baden-Powell, Daniel Carter Beard, Ernest T. Seton, and many interested community leaders to give direction to the infant program of Boy Scouts of America. On January 2, 1911, West and others formed the National Council, B.S.A. During that year the Scout Oath, Law, badges and fundamental policies were established. Under his leadership over the next 33 years, Scouting grew and matured into the movement we recognize and enjoy today.

Why is he recognized?

James E. West is credited with not only helping form Scouting but guiding, protecting, and nurturing the program through many critical challenges. His leadership and foresight into the value of and need for Scouting in this country exemplified Ralph Waldo Emerson's observation: "...an institution is the lengthened shadow of one man."

Who can become a James E. West Fellow?

Organizations or individuals may contribute an award in honor of someone - an Eagle Scout, a Silver Beaver recipient, Council, District or Unit Scouter, or in memory of a departed loved one. It is a significant honor for a Scouting supporter to be named a James E. West Fellow. It indicates that the nominee has the same dedication to Scouting as was Mr. West.



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



WHAT IS WEBELOS RESIDENT CAMP?

Webelos Resident Camp is an opportunity for Webelos Scouts to come to camp and be introduced to the adventure of Boy Scout Resident Camp. Webelos Scouts are the transition between Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts.

Boys will be organized into patrols, not dens, and guided by a staff member as boys choose a patrol leader and move around camp in their daily activities. 



<u>Deposit:</u> A \$250 non-refundable deposit per troop is required to reserve space at summer camp. This deposit assures your troop a campsite at summer camp, but does not guarantee the site selected. Your final site selection will be based upon the number of boys attending summer camp and the capacity of the campsite selected. Depending on size, there may be more than one troop per campsite. The Camp Director makes the final decision on campsite selection. We will strive to meet the needs of all troops.

March 15th— 50% of balance due. (The \$250 deposit goes toward total balance. See camp statement for exact amount due.)

May 15th— Remaining balance is due at the Council Offices. This includes the Scout portion for any in-council Opportunity Fund grants. If a Mount Baker Council Troop qualifies for a Friends of Scouting discount, all fees must be received by May 15th to receive the discount.

Please notify the Everett office of changes to your reservation numbers as soon as possible. Changes made after May 15th need to be in writing. You may add Scouts at any time - fees/due dates as indicated above. If you drop Scouts prior to the May 15th final payment, fees paid will apply to your balance. After the May 15th final payment, drops of paid youth are subject to a 25% refund fee. To avoid refund fees, do not pay for youth who have not yet paid the troop.

Please pay in full <u>prior</u> to camp arrival for quicker camp check-in.

Refunds: The \$250 site fee is non-refundable after December 30, 2016. Requests concerning refunds must be made in writing to the Mount Baker Council Service Center, 1715 - 100th PI SE, Suite B, Everett, Washington 98208 at least 30 days prior to the start of camp. A service charge of 25% is assessed on all refunds.

No refunds are granted for requests made less than 30 days prior to camp, unless there is a medically documented illness/injury, death in the family or the family moves out of the area. To receive consideration for these cases, our refund request form must be submitted on or before the date of arrival at camp. Form on council website under camping.

Leadership Requirements: Each troop must have two adult leaders present while in camp. This policy applies, even when two troops share a campsite, unless pre-approved by the Camp Director. One adult must be at least 21 years of age, assistants at least 18 years of age. At least one adult leader must be registered with the BSA. It is highly recommended that at least one of the adult leaders be at camp for the entire week. All adults in camp must provide documentation for current Youth Protection Training.

Medical Information: All youth and adult summer camp attendees are required to obtain a medical evaluation by a certified and licensed health -care provider using the BSA form "Annual Health and Medical Record" of which Parts A, B, and C are to be completed. Current BSA forms can be downloaded at http://www.scouting.org/scoutsource/healthandsafety/ ahmr.aspx.

Insurance: Each troop from outside the Mount Baker Council is required to provide proof of its own unit health and accident insurance. All Scouts must be registered members of the BSA.

Pre-Camp Leaders' Meeting and Webinars: Orientations for summer camp troop leaders are held before your troop enters camp. The following is covered: camp schedules, new and revised programs, merit badge sign-ups, arrival and departure procedures. MB sign-up details are sent to the Primary Contact person a month prior to camp.


